

# Kay's Kitchen

**Memorial Day Weekend—Hot dogs—**  
 Franke or what have you. Why do they  
 seem to go together like Ham and  
 eggs? Maybe it is because if it usually  
 is the first thing cooked on this day.  
 grills, the picnic will more than likely  
 be on your backyard, so go ahead  
 and grill your hot dogs. Don't  
 forget the buns, relishes, etc.  
 I'll give you a good vegetable  
 coleslaw salad. You can make it the  
 day before, most men like it and it  
 makes enough to serve 10 or 12. So if  
 friends come by, don't worry you will  
 have enough.

**VEGETABLE SALAD**  
 1 package lemon jello, 1/4 cups  
 boiling water, Add 1 teaspoon salt, 1/8  
 teaspoon red pepper, 3 tablespoons  
 sugar, 1/2 cup vinegar and 1 tablespoon  
 lemon juice. Stir until jello is dissolved.  
 Prepare and add: 1 tablespoon grated  
 onion, 1/2 cup chopped pimento, 1/2 cup  
 sliced celery, 1/2 cup shredded  
 cabbage, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper,  
 1/2 cup grated carrot, 1 cup chopped  
 pecans. Pour into large oblong pyrex  
 dish.  
 The meal would not be complete  
 without baked beans. If you want the  
 real thing try this recipe.

**BAKED BEANS**  
 To make water dried beans (Navy or  
 Great Northern) overnight. Remember  
 to soak well over the half way mark  
 on your saucepan. Next morning  
 bring to a boil. Simmer about  
 1 hour. Drain, saving liquid. Add to  
 beans, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/4 cup  
 brown sugar, 1/4 cup catsup, 1  
 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/4 teaspoon  
 salt, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.

Taste this, you may want to add more  
 sugar or a bit of molasses or more  
 catsup. Place in greased baker. Cover  
 the beans with reserved bean water.  
 Put several slices of bacon on top. Put  
 top on baker and cook in slow oven 250  
 degrees about six hours. If they become  
 dry, add reserved liquid. Cook  
 uncovered for the last hour.  
 If all this sounds too much there are  
 several good canned baked beans. Open  
 and add a bit of brown sugar and catsup  
 to taste, cover with bacon and bake  
 until bacon is crisp.  
 For those who like to experiment  
 and dare to give something different  
 even in the way of frandrufers, try  
 these ideas.  
 2 cups chopped frank, 1/4 cup grated  
 cheese, 2 hard boiled eggs, chopped, 3  
 tablespoons chili sauce, 2 tablespoons  
 pickle relish, 1/2 teaspoon prepared  
 mustard, 1/4 teaspoon celery seed.  
 Combine all ingredients. Fill buns with  
 mixture. Wrap each securely in foil.  
 Place on baking sheet and bake 400  
 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.  
 This makes enough for about eight  
 sandwiches. You can put them on your  
 grill and cook about same length of  
 time, turning about three times.

**BARBECUED FRANKS**  
 You may use your favorite barbecue  
 sauce. Grill frank, brushing often with  
 sauce. Serve on buns.  
 For the children, please don't forget  
 the marshmallows!  
**PEPPER ROLLS**  
 One-half pound melted margarine or  
 Crisco and some butter, 1 cup scalded  
 milk, 1 yeast cake dissolved in 1/2 cup  
 lukewarm water and 1 heaping  
 tablespoon sugar, 2 eggs beaten with  
 1/2 cup sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt.  
 When margarine is lukewarm, add 1  
 cup sugar and yeast mixture. Stir in 4 cups  
 sifted flour. Chill 7 hours or overnight.  
 Work dough, make out in rolls, place  
 on greased baking sheet, let rise 4  
 hours in warm place. Bake 12 to 15  
 minutes at 350 degrees.
