Roberts requests Paris Rd. clarifications

FRANKFORT—State Department of Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts has asked consultants on the widening of Paris Pike in Fayette and Bourbon counties to respond to significant questions about their two-lane proposal. In a letter to Wallace, Melting, Roberts and Todd dated Oct. 27 and made public recently, the secretary requested that their final report include a statement about the right-of-way requirements of a two-lane road. Expressing concern that their two-lane proposal might appear to be a "painless solution" to the problem presented by conflicting interests of highway users and property-owners, Roberts said the consultant's final report should show that even two lanes would demand "substantial additional right-of-way."

In the first draft of its report, WMRT concluded, "For the most of the projected (traffic) demands, a well designed, two lane highway with adequate shoulders will provide sufficient capacity." The consultant's proposal provides for two lanes of initial construction.

Secretary Roberts' letter also notes that other possible corridors for reconstructed US 215 & the Paris Lexington Road, have been extensively studied by the Bureau of Highways, although, not by WMRT. Roberts expressed disappointment that the consultant had not reviewed the Bureau of Highways' four-lane plans for modifications that would lessen their impact on the Paris Pike corridor. However, he noted, WMRT may believe its basic recommendation meets the terms of its contract. In discussing the contents of his letter, Roberts said he is not awaiting WMRT's final report which will respond to questions raised by the secretary and the Bureau's engineering staff. The consulting firm is not expected to change or modify its conclusion. But it will add detail and clarifications to the draft. By terms of its contract, WMRT has 14 days after receipt of Roberts' response in which to prepare the final report. "When I have it," Roberts said, "my staff and I will give it a final evaluation, then I will decide what our next step is."

In keeping with his policy of openness, the secretary said he will disclose that decision as soon as possible. Wallace, Melting, Roberts and Todd, a Philadelphia firm, is the consultant selected by a committee of Fayette and Bourbon county citizens which Secretary Roberts appointed on Oct. 31, 1975.

The action followed the protest of horse farm owners and environmental groups that the highway bureau's proposed four-lane reconstruction of the Paris-Lexington Road would damage the scenic and historic character of the Paris Pike corridor. The committee's recommendation of WMRT was received Sept. 27, 1976. After negotiation, a contract for their study was signed by the secretary on Sept. 28 and publicly released without comment on Sept. 27.

Terry McBrayer named Commissioner of Commerce

FRANKFORT—Lexington Attorney W. Terry McBrayer said recently that he has accepted Gov. Julian Carroll's urging that he become Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Commerce. The appointment is effective Jan. 1, 1977. McBrayer is a former five-term Kentucky legislator, a long-time aide to Gov. Carroll, and a former executive in the Carroll Administration. Gov. Carroll pointed out that McBrayer had agreed once before to leave his private law practice to return to the Kentucky Government. McBrayer was in charge of the transition as Gov. Carroll took office in December, 1970, and then became the governor's chief executive officer, remaining in that post nearly a year before leaving to become a partner of the Louisville and Lexington-based legal firm of Tarrant, Conble, Bullitt and McBrayer.

"I consider Gov. Carroll's request that I serve as Kentucky Commissioner of Commerce a distinct honor," said McBrayer, "but, more than that, a real challenge to help him accomplish his economic development goals, the creation of as many new jobs as possible, and the coordinated effort in the areas of agriculture, tourism, finance, energy and industrial development. "As you may know, I have been a member of the Kentucky Port and River Development Commission, and

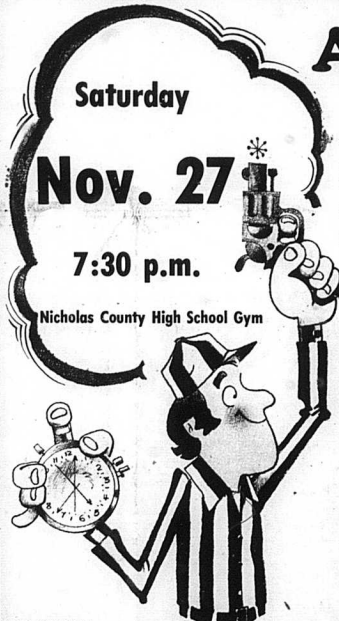
