The survey, based on sightings made by rural mail carriers during June, July and August, shows that quali populations are up 2.2 per cent state wide, with the biggest increase in the

wide, with the biggest increase in the far western part of the state. The rabbit population shows a slight-er increase—93 per cent statewide over last year, with the Hills of Bluegrass
