

# Jackets' end season with 10-2 record

The Nicholas County Bluejackets won their last regular season game against the Fleming County Panthers here last night.

The Jackets' homecoming game got off to a good start with Nicholas County leading 10-0 in the first quarter. Both were scored by Greg Letcher, the first occurring middle of the quarter.

Later, Timmy Wilson's kick for the extra point was good. With 12 seconds left in the quarter Letcher plunged in three yards for his second score. The extra point kick attempt by Wilson was no good, making the score 13-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Fleming County's only score came late in the second quarter when Handy Sargent ran 10 yards for the touchdown. The Panthers' extra point run was no good. With only 10 seconds left in the half, Clifford Thompson returned the Fleming County kickoff 53 yards for a touchdown, but it was called back because he stepped out of bounds on the Nicholas County 39 yard line. The half ended with the score 13-6 in favor of Nicholas County.

Midway through the third quarter Fleming County was forced to punt, and Greg Willis returned the ball to the Panthers' 37 yard line. The next play lost four yards. A flag, on the second play, set Fleming County back 15 yards for face mask offense. This gave the Jackets a first down on Fleming County's 19 yard line. Damon Booth ran five yards, followed by a 14 yard run by Clifford Thompson for the touchdown. A pass from Joe Raddell to Timmy Ockerman for the extra points was incomplete, leaving the score 19-6 at the end of the third quarter.

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## Kentucky afield

With Kentucky's small game season opening Nov. 18, the commonwealth's hunters are wondering what kind of success they can expect afield this year.

The answer, according to one survey conducted by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, is that hunters will find slightly higher populations of quail and rabbits throughout the state.

The survey, based on sightings made by rural mail carriers during June, July and August, shows that quail populations are up 2.3 per cent statewide, with the biggest increase in the far western part of the state.

The rabbit population shows a slight increase—39 per cent statewide over last year, with the Hills of Bluegrass showing the largest jump.

Quail and rabbit hunting regulations remain basically unchanged from past years. The daily limit on quail is 10, with possession limit of 20 after two or more days of hunting. The daily bag limit on rabbits is six, with a possession limit of 12.

Rabbit season will close Jan. 31, while quail season will continue to run through Feb. 28. Shotgun used for small game, dove and squirrel hunting must be permitted to carry slugs or buckshot in the field while small game hunting.

Remember also that small game seasons will close during the Dec. 4 through Dec. 8 gun deer season.

Squirrel hunting will also require Nov. 18 with generally much better hunting conditions than those encountered during the early part of the season. The foliage will be off most of the trees, and squirrels will be more concentrated around mast producing trees such as oak, beech or walnut.

So if your luck wasn't too good during August and September squirrel hunts, don't give up yet. Winter hunting can be very productive. After the recess for the Dec. 4 through Dec. 8 deer season, squirrel hunting will continue through Dec. 31, with a daily limit of six and a possession limit of 12.

The taking season for furbers will also open Nov. 18, and the big change in regulations this year is a limit on raccoons. This limit is one raccoon per hunter or three per hunting party of three or more hunters. This is a daily limit; there is no possession limit as such on raccoons.

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## Three county deer check stations named

At the station, the hunter will fill out a special portion of the deer permit, which will be retained by the station operator. The remainder of the tag will be stamped for validation.

A statewide list of check stations is available wherever deer permits are sold or from any county clerk's office. Hunters buying deer tags should receive this list when the tag is purchased.

All conservation officers may also check deer and validate tags. The deer must be taken to the nearest officer or to the nearest open check station no later than 9 a.m. on the day after the deer is harvested.

The purpose of the check stations, according to Game Management Director Joe Bruns, is to allow fish and wildlife to obtain a quick and accurate assessment of the total deer harvest in the state.

In past years, harvest estimates were obtained by a post-season mail survey, with the results coming in too late for the information to be used in setting seasons for the coming year. Bruns said, adding that the check station method of obtaining information will prove useful in a variety of deer management projects around the state.

How hunters need not check their deer, except at a few areas with specially managed hunts. However, bow hunters who purchased their permits before the check station list was distributed and who plan to gun hunt during the Dec. 4 through Dec. 8 period should obtain this list, either from the county clerk or by writing the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Capital Plaza Tower, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

## Third livestock expo draws 5,000 entries

More than 5,000 head of beef cattle and sheep have been entered for the Third Annual National American Livestock Exposition, coming Nov. 12-20 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center in Louisville.

The Exposition, which is one of the five largest major livestock shows in the nation, features 14 sheep shows, 10 cattle shows and 13 sales for 1976. Some \$130,000 in premiums and awards is at stake for the competitors.

The national recognition gained for exhibiting a champion.

Several new activities have been added to the 1976 Exposition, including a Perod-Five Feeder Cattle Contest and sale, a National Junior College Livestock Judging Contest and the Sale of Champion Hoglets.

This year's Exposition boasts the National Champion Show plus the national show for 40 different breeds of sheep—Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown and Montadale.

Nine beef cattle sales will be conducted, with the breed associations representing Charolais, Hereford, Blonde d'Aquitaine, Hereford, Maine-Anjou, Chianina, Simmental and Limousin each holding a sale. In addition, the North American will sponsor a feeder calf sale.

The animals selling in this auction will have been shown in competition the previous day.

The four sheep sales scheduled during the North American deserve special note as each of them is the National Sale for that particular breed association. The breeds holding these sales are Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown and Montadale.

Besides being able to purchase livestock at the North American, attendees will also be able to buy almost every imaginable kind of equipment and service available to the stockman.

## UK basketball history written

Kentucky Basketball's Big Blue Magazine, an exciting new history of University of Kentucky basketball, is scheduled to come off the press Thursday afternoon and should be in book stores throughout the state early next week.

Written by UK sports information director Russell Rice as a follow-up to his successful The Wildcat and Kentucky Football, published late last winter, the new book traces the story of UK basketball from the very beginning and through the NIT championship story of this year.

Containing almost 500 pages and more than 100 photographs, the book is the largest in a series of three dozen college sports books published by the Strode Publishers of Huntsville, Ala.

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
