Studied Snow Tires Before on Fry Road
"When you buy snow tires, go that extra mile and buy them studded," That's the advice the National Safety Council, which cites studies to back this statement. Their tests on braking distance on glare ice show that studded snow tires on the rear improve braking distance by 18 percent.

"Their tests also show that there is very little performance difference on glare ice between regular high-tread tires and unstudded snow tires.

"One big mistake some people make with studded tires is overdriving. If they would ordinarily drive a cautious 30 miles per hour on icy roads with regular tires, they might push that speedometer on up to 50 miles on studded tires. When you do that, you are losing the safety advantage of studded tires."

If you don't have to be on the road every day or go out in bad weather, you can probably get by without snow tires. But if you travel a lot, on undrained roads, studded snow tires will make your driving hours safer. And for half the price of a new tire, or less, you can buy a retreaded snow tire that will do just as good a job for you.

If one of those scary Kentucky winters sets in, you may also want to invest in a set of chains. Tests show that they will improve your stopping distance 50 percent over that of regular tires, and 30 percent over that of a car with studded snow tires on the rear.
