## Carroll discusses judicial article at KACO meeting

Gov. Julian Carroll told an assembly of more than 400 county officials last Thursday that the state is "on the threshold of great improvement" in government services and suggested that the implementation of the judicial article will be the beginning of the improvements.

Joseph H. Conley, Nicholas County Attorney, attended the two-day meeting of County Attorneys and other county officials in Louisville.

But Gov. Carroll said that there will be "mistakes" in the judicial system that will have to be dealt with in future sessions and possibly special sessions of the legislature. He said he could not yet identify the possible complications.

A special session of the General Assembly is planned later this year to consider how to put the new judicial system into operation. Voters approved the article as a constitutional amendment in 1972.

"I would predict that we will make a number of mistakes," Gov. Carroll said, adding, "we will have an opportunity to correct them in the 1978 General Assembly. It may well take more than the '78 session... to completely resolve the magnitude of questions" about the new system. He then asked the county judges, magistrates and other officials to speak up and help identify areas of concern.

## Baugus attends operator's school

Clarence Baugus, Carlisle Sewer Plant Manager, plans to return today (Thursday) from Lexington where he has been attending the 23rd annual Water and Wastewater operator's school. The school which has been going on since Monday, Nov. 15 at the Continental Inn, is sponsored by the divisions of sanitary engineering and water quality in the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.

The operators will be eligible for certification after qualifying on tests covering water laws, bacteriology, chemistry and monitoring plans. Kentucky state law requires that water and wastewater operators be certified for one of nine job classifications. To be promoted from a low classification, an operator must first become certified in a higher grade classification.

Sanitary engineering director Nick Johnson said that since the certification became a requirement in 1967, more than 3,000 water and wastewater treatment plant and water distribution system operators have been certified. The first year the school was held, when certification was still optional, 40 persons attended. This year Johnson estimates about 400 applicants will enroll for the school and certification. According to Johnson, the upcoming training session will complement the regional schools in preparing water and wastewater treatment plants, he said, "can only be assured when the operating and managing personnel are properly trained and qualified."
