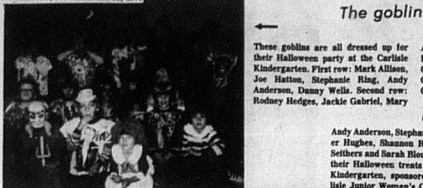


Kindergartners very active

WEDCO announces adoption of amended food regulation

The WEDCO District Health Department of which Nicholas county is a participating member has announced that the amended Retail Food Market Sanitation Regulation, which was adopted by the Department for Human Resources and which became effective June 2, 1975, requires that all establishments from which food or food products are offered for sale to the consumer and are intended for off premises consumption shall obtain a permit to operate as a retail food market from the local county/district health department. However, the definition of a retail food market exempts establishments which handle only pre-packaged, snack-type, non-potentially hazardous foods, markets that offer only fresh fruits and vegetables for sale, food service establishments, food and beverage vending machines, vending machine commissaries, and food processing establishments from obtaining a permit under this Regulation. Most of these establishments are permitted under other Department of Human Resources Regulations. The regulation establishes minimum sanitary and facility requirements.

Those establishments existing prior to June 2, 1975, which only deal with pre-packaged food products and/or permit their food processing to the cutting and slicing of ready to eat foods, will be exempt from certain construction requirements, if no public health nuisance exists.

All retail food markets will be visited by the local health department environmentalist within the near future in order to fully explain the requirements of the regulation with the owners and operators of all retail food markets. Markets not fully complying with the minimum requirements of the regulation will be given an adequate time period to bring their establishments into compliance.

Any person desiring to operate a retail food market shall make written application for a permit. Upon receipt of an application, the Department shall make an inspection of the retail food market to determine compliance with the provisions of this regulation. When inspection reveals that the applicable requirements of this regulation have been met, a permit shall be issued. Permits shall not be transferable from one person to another or from place to place.

Manager of Lions Blue Grass Fair is named

The Blue Grass Fair will be held at Masterson Station Park on Leestown Road in Lexington on July 15 through July 23, 1977.

Don C. Sullivan, a native Kentuckian, has been named manager of the Lions Blue Grass Fair for 1977, according to Joseph Hager, president of the Lexington Lions Club.

The Blue Grass Fair has developed into one of the largest events of its type in America and is totally under canvas. It serves as a regional fair, with participation from 77 Kentucky counties and attendance ranging around 100,000 annually. The total profits from the fair go to charity.

A graduate of the University of Kentucky, the 41-year-old manager has served the fair in various capacities in previous years. His most recent assignment was chairman of the agriculture division.

Sullivan is a member of the Lexington Lions Club, the owner and principal operator of the fair. He is a life member of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association, the K Men's Association, Christian Pilots of America, and the Ohio Valley Conference Football Official's Association.

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
