By Kay Cooley A strong Bluejacket defensive effort prevented the Bath County Wildcats from scoring again early in the second quarter Friday night after the Wildcats had earned a first down on the Bluejackets one yard line.

All the scoring took place in the first quarter. Nicholas County scored first when R.T. Massey scooped up a Wildcat fumble and sprinted 59 yards for the touchdown. Tim Wilson's kick attempt for the extra point failed, and the Bluejackets led 6-0. Nicholas County's Tim Moreland kicked off to the Wildcats and the first play from scrimmage Earl Jones carried the ball 70 yards to the Nicholas County 10 yard line. Three plays later Ralph Jones ran the ball seven yards for the Bath County score. Kincaid's kick for the extra point was good, putting Bluejackets ahead 13-0.
