Experts who were hired by the Fiscal Court to study the local situation, state that the "cheapest solution in order to meet these new laws and regulations regarding hospitals, is to build a new hospital adjacent to the Nursing Home. Those who want a local hospital, but who don't believe that a new one is necessary, are only fooling themselves.
