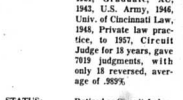

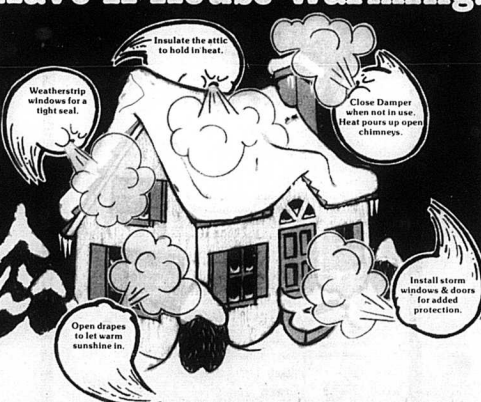

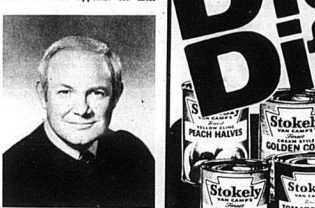
Judge Robert Greene seeks Court of Appeals election

Judge Robert G. Greene, who formerly practiced law in Burlington, recently appointed by Governor Julian Carroll to the bench of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, Sixth District, Second Division, is seeking re-election to that position on Nov. 2.

County Attorney Joseph H. Conley has been named by Judge Greene as his county chairman for re-election. Prior to his serving as a Judge of the Court of Appeals, Greene served in other judicial positions including trial commissioner of Boone County Juvenile Court and probate commissioner of Boone County Court. He has also frequently served as a special commissioner in the Boone Circuit Court.

Greene said that he is pleased with his new position and enjoys his work which consists of reviewing cases appealed from the circuit courts. Although elected from a district of 29 counties he is required to travel the entire state sitting with two other appellate judges to hear oral arguments in these appeals. He later resigned these positions to accept appointment to the court.
