WEDCO report given

The WEDCO District Health Department, represented by Rev. Bert Eyster, presented its annual report to the Nicholas County Fiscal Court on Oct. 19.

The health district comprises, besides Nicholas, Bourbon, Harrison and Scott counties, and figures were given for services rendered in these counties. In Nicholas, field visits amounted to 1630; office and clinic visits were 4724; patients screened were 848; clinics were 31; referrals were 293; and admissions were 935.

Home health services, limited to home bound people who need skilled nursing services under doctor's orders, stayed at around 16 monthly. Nurses made 859 visits during the year in the county.

L&N abandonment to be subject

All citizens interested in keeping the L&N Railroad in Nicholas county and surrounding counties are asked to come to a meeting at the Nicholas County Courthouse on Monday, Nov. 1 at 7 p.m. The L&N Railroad has petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission to abandon the railroad line between Paris and Maysville.

A representative from Blue Grass Area Development District, the 17-county group backing the opposition to the abandonment, will be present. Also, persons interested in taking over the line as a private business will be at the meeting to explain their proposals. Officials and interested persons from

surrounding counties have also been invited.
Carlisle has a depot, presently being used by the Jaycees, which is of historical value. Out of a total of around 200 railroad stations in Kentucky, only 50 remain. The L&N owns the depot and leases it to Mathers-Shearer.

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under the donor plan:
The county's quota will be 340 units from Oct., 1978 to Oct., 1979. The 73 units obtained Thursday counts toward this quota. Blue Grass Industries' goal is to obtain 90 units in January—the amount counts when given. Also, the Center estimates that 10%, or about 35 units, will be assigned to Nicholas county, but be given elsewhere. This leaves 210 (including the 73 units to be donated by Oct. 1977 from Nicholas countians in four seasons. The first will be held in March, 1977.

Rev. Sugg has asked for a double crew of technicians for the March blood giving. He stated that if the 210 units are obtained before the four seasons are held, the remaining ones will be cancelled.

He also stated that he hopes that Nicholas countians will not become discouraged, and not give next time, because of the poor planning of the Lexington Center.

The moral of this story to me is—that Nicholas countians close through when it's necessary. They surely did so last Thursday.

1. Nicholas County Court—disposition of all criminal cases which appear in County Court, and the civil cases filed. Both to be reported weekly. Court meets as often as needed.

2. Carlisle Police Court—disposition of all cases in Police Court weekly. Court meets on Saturday mornings and Monday nights.

3. Nicholas Circuit Court—civil suits filed, to be reported monthly. Grand jury indictments and petit jury trials during Circuit Court terms in February, May and September. This is being done to keep the public informed.

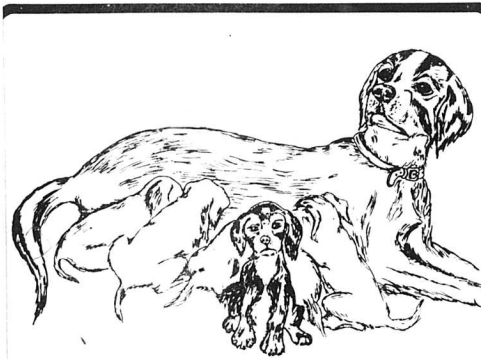
