Beef check-off vote is Tuesday

A "check-off" referendum related to financing a promotion, consumer education and research program for Kentucky's beef cattle industry is scheduled state-wide on Tuesday, Sept. 7.

All persons engaged in commercial cattle production are eligible to vote in the referendum, which was authorized by recent state legislation. Voting in this county will be at the Extension office in the courthouse from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. next Tuesday.

Under the proposal, 10 cents per head for all cattle sold on the commercial market would go into a fund to finance the industry promotion, education and research program. This amount would be "checked off" at the time of the sale and sent monthly by the auction market officials to the Kentucky Beef Cattle Association, which would administer the program. Producers not wishing to participate could request refunds. Eligible voters are defined in the

referendum rules as "tenants and sharecroppers sharing in the proceeds of the sale of bovine animals" as well as "owners of farms on which bovine animals are produced". Each person qualifying will have one vote. A producer will vote in the county where his principal place of business is located. More details on the referendum are available at the county Extension office or from Harvey Wagoner.

Creative and imaginative students often are not recognized by their teachers. The following persons were all identified as low achievers or misfits on the job:



