Ministerial Association supports new hospital

The Nicholas County Ministerial Association in regular session on Sept. 11 went on record as supporting the erection of a new hospital for Nicholas county.

This action in no way obligates any of the churches in which the ministers serve. It is only the personal support that the ministers wish to give to this endeavor.

This action came because the ministers are of the opinion that they, outside of the medical and hospital staff, are more closely connected with the physical plant of the present hospital than the average person in Nicholas county, according to Rev. H. Dallas Sugg, secretary. Therefore, they feel they are in a position to know something of the inadequacies of the present plant, Rev. Sugg stated.

If in the future there could be made available some sort of information pertaining to the proposed hospital, the ministers, upon approval of the respective churches, agreed to use such materials as bulletin inserts.

The ministers also would like to go on record in commending the Mathers Home, Inc. Board and the maintenance personnel for the job that they have done lately in improving the interior of the hospital.

City trash pick-up payment to be mandatory

City Council voted unanimously 5-0, Monday night to make it mandatory that all businesses, residences and apartments within the City pay for trash pick-up.

The five Councilmen, with Alex Crawford absent because of illness, requested the City Attorney Billy Hopkins to draft such an ordinance.

Hopkins was asked by unanimous Council vote to draft two other ordinances: parking meter fines will be raised to \$2.00 if paid within 12 hours and \$2.50 after that time limit, and, the zoning ordinance as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

A called meeting will be held on Monday, Sept. 27, to discuss City chemical uses and expenses. Compared to \$1,786.83 spent for chemicals in 1973, as of Aug. 12, 1976, \$12,234.65 has already been spent by the City. This figure could rise to around \$30,000 before the end of the year.

Resignations by patrolmen Jim Moore and Donald Selva were read and accepted by Council. In further police business, George Bills of Paris was hired as a patrolman at \$430 per month. Justice Irvin was promoted to the rank Sgt. at a salary of \$550.

Jewel K. Vise asked the City to file the open storm drain to the creek in front of his property across from the County Fire Department. The matter was referred to the Sewer Committee.

A letter from Gov. Julian Carroll was read by Mayor Bill Power inviting the community to hold a Prayer Breakfast on Oct. 6 at 8:30 a.m. in conjunction with the state. Councilman Calvin Wills was appointed to contact the Ministerial Association and the Chamber of Commerce to make arrangements for this bi-centennial event.

City apartment rents will be raised, effective Oct. 1, to \$70 and \$75. They are presently \$60 and \$65.

The rusty water problems were discussed by Council. Particular trouble areas seem to be Race Street and East Union Road.

Mert Evans asked if water and sewer would be provided by the City to his lot should he complete negotiations for a cut-rate gas station there. Council agreed. Evans said the station would have one self-service pump and two others.

Other motions passed include:

- To reimburse Sewer Plant Manager Clarence Haugus \$60 expense money for the four days he attended school in Lexington recently.
- To buy a Pitney Bowes 250 series copier for the City office for \$941 if the maintenance contract is satisfactory.
- To prepare a resolution supporting the new hospital bond issue.
- To buy the five-volume Municipal Corporation Law, requested by Hopkins.

The recent blacktopping bill amounted to \$27,000, most of which is being paid from Revenue Sharing funds.
