Couple to Couple League marks fifth anniversary

September marked the fifth anniversary of the founding of the Couple to Couple League, a national, interfaith organization for teaching natural family planning (NFP). From its inception in 1971, it has grown steadily and expects to have close to 100 teaching couples providing services in about 25 states by the end of 1976.

There is increasing interest in natural family planning for several reasons, according to the League. Adverse side effects of the Pill and IUD provide a health reason; the unchanging teaching of the Catholic Church provides a religious reason; and seeing linkages between the contraceptive mentality and abortifacients provides a moral reason. The realization that modern NFP can be as effective as the Pill and IUD provides a practical reason. In addition, some couples see a link between the growth of the contraceptive mentality and the overall decline of sexual morality in recent years and they want to reverse the trend, starting with themselves.

National 4-H Week Oct. 3-9

4-H grows in county as 425 members start year

By Joan W. Conley Approximately 425 Nicholas county young people will observe National 4-H Week Oct. 3-9. The 4-H theme this year is "4-H Room to Grow" and it seems to be doing so here in Nicholas county. There are 11 4-H clubs in the county with a total of 104 volunteer leaders and 39 sponsors who help in many project areas. Some of the most popular projects among Nicholas county 4-H'ers are sewing, electrically woodcraft, according to Sharon Alexander, 4-H extension agent.

First in State The first 4-H Drama Club in the State of Kentucky was organized this summer under the guidance of Mrs. Joan Hardin and Mrs. Bobby Duncan. An original play, written by Mrs. Hardin, entitled *Clanredra Goes to the Merp* will be presented sometime this school year. The idea of the Drama Club is to provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to perform all aspects of presenting a stage play—from acting to costume making to props.

New Beef Project Another interesting new project this year is the beef project with Eddie Day as project chairman. Day, who was chairman of the Beef Show at the Nicholas County Fair, is working on obtaining donated calves to be raised by 4-H'ers. The youth and the producer

would share the cost of the feed, and when the calf was sold they would share the profit equally. Day said he has about five or possibly six calves promised already from Nicholas county farms. Any 4-H'er interested in raising one of these calves to discuss the details of contracting the calves.

State and Area Officers G. L. Cartwright of Nicholas county is the State 4-H Leader's Council president, and his brother, Bobby Cartwright, is Bluegrass Area county president, which includes nine counties. Bobby Cartwright is also county president.

Project chairmen are Mrs. James Lowe, clothing project; Charles Gates, electricity; Paul and Linda Toder, woodcraft; Delma Murray, beef, knitting; and Lavina McFarland, cattle.

4-H'ers in Nicholas county, and everywhere, can be proud that they have the opportunity to broaden their personal growth and development, and, at the same time to broaden their interests and concern for others. Their leaders can be proud that they have participated in this challenge to our leaders of tomorrow.
