KU's Western group favors union reps

Recently Kentucky Utilities Company received certification from the National Labor Relations Board which was issued Friday, certifying the results of an election held on Sept. 9 in which Kentucky Utilities Company's employees who work in its Western Division voted in favor of the designation by NLRB of the United Steel Workers of America as their collective bargaining representative. The election was conducted among operating, production, maintenance, and construction employees.

Western Division—one of KU's four geographic divisions—extends west to Fulton county, north to Union county, and east to Ohio county, and includes the Green River Generating Station and its Morganfield, Baskow, Dawson Springs, Earlington, and Greenville districts.

In a similar NLRB conducted election in May of this year, KU's Blue Grass Division employees rejected representation by the same union. With Lexington as its largest city, Blue Grass Division includes the KU generating stations at Ghent and Tyrore and its districts headquartered at Lexington, Carrillon, Georgetown, Maysville, Morehead, Mt. Sterling, Paris, Versailles, and Winchester.

PSG dismisses South Central Bell rate increase request

FRANKFORT—The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC), in a unanimous decision, dismissed South Central Bell Telephone Company's case requesting a \$60.5 million annual rate increase.

The PSC ruling followed motions by the PSC staff and the attorneys for the Consumer Protection Division of the state Attorney General's office.

In sustaining the staff motion to dismiss, PSC Chairman Barkley Sturgill said, "The filing is deficient in that the application fails to conform to the requirements and regulations on which this commission can determine just and reasonable rates."

"This information was not filed and asserted to the application as required by statute, nor is it contained in the testimony which has been filed with this commission," he added.

By law, the PSC has five months in which to either grant or deny rate increases. If a decision has not been reached in this time period, the company requesting the rate increase may petition for a hearing on its effect, subject to refund, without the authority of the commission.

The new \$50 million Lexington Center, Lexington, will open its doors to the public on Thursday, Oct. 7 when the Central Kentucky Exposition is held in the convention-exhibition hall.

Mupp Arena, with its seating capacity of nearly 23,000, will open the following week featuring an international concert artist. The Mall at Lexington Center is scheduled to have shops begin opening right away. The Hyatt Hotel, still under construction, will open early in 1977.

The University of Kentucky Wildcats will move into Rupp Arena this basketball season. Under the auspices of the Lexington Center Corporation and the Lexington Chamber of Commerce, the Central Kentucky Exposition will feature displays of business and industry in Lexington and Central Kentucky.

The exposition, which will run through Oct. 16, will include approximately 150 exhibitors. It is expected to attract from 50,000-100,000 persons to Lexington.
