To start the family dinner, serve from the usual beef and potatoes to peas, carrots, or cauliflower. Any of these meats can be prepared in a dozen different ways. The most common is to broil or roast. You must pan fry or deep fry the fish each time. Broil and fry something new. After all your family may like it. The following recipe is from Elise Anderson and all have been good, and different.

GLAZED BROILED FILETS

3 pounds skinless sole filets or other fish. Place on well greased broiler pan. Brush with 1/4 cup lemon juice and let stand 15 minutes.

Combine and set aside:

- 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup of Tabasco sauce

Brush fish 3/4 inches from heat 6 to 8 minutes until fish is fairly brown on one side and seared with grated Parmesan cheese. Broil 2 to 3 minutes.

How to prepare this for a small family as you can eat it hot or cold in half. You may want to use just a little less lemon juice either way. If you want to serve with a baked potato, cook the potato first, and keep in a warm place while you broil the fish.
