DANDELION WINE
1 gal. boiling water over 3 qt. dandelion blooms
LEFT STAND OVERNIGHT. STRAIN INTO LITER
juice of 1 orange
1 lb. granulated sugar
BOIL FOR 30 MINUTES. COOL
SPREAD
1 slice of toast with 1/4 cake yeast
ADD TO LIQUID. Let stand for 4 weeks or until fermentation ceases. Bottle and cork well.

Kentucky women artists may enter UK exhibit

All Kentucky women artists working in the areas of painting, drawing, sculpture and photography are invited to submit their work for the first statewide exhibition of Kentucky women's art.

The exhibition, to be hung in the University of Kentucky Art Gallery June 16-21, is sponsored by the Kentucky Observance of International Women's Year.

Women artists are invited to bring their work to the University Art Gallery, located in the UK Fine Arts Building on Rose Street, Thursday and Friday, June 23, where works will be selected for inclusion in the exhibit.

Ellen Johnson of Oberlin College, internationally known writer and lecturer on contemporary art, will make the selection and will take part in an informal question-and-answer period Saturday, June 4, at the Art Gallery. The session is free and open to the public.

"We hope for a statewide response to this invitation," said Gloria Singleton, chairperson of the exhibition organizing committee, "since we would like to really show exhibition."

Women sculptors are invited to submit models and site plans for publicly placed sculpture as well as models will be displayed for consideration and a specific site should be designated by the artist.

DISABLED PEOPLE MAY HAVE WORKED ENOUGH TO GET SOCIAL SECURITY

Some people who became disabled don't apply for social security disability payments because they think they haven't worked long enough, but they may be wrong.

They may be young people who've worked only a few years. They may think that a disabled worker needs five years of work covered by social security to be eligible for payments—but before age 31 need less than five years of covered work, in some cases as little as 1 1/2 years.

Disabled workers over 31 need more than five years of covered work with five years of it in the 10 years before they became disabled to be eligible for social security disability benefits.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible workers under 8 and their families if the worker is disabled and not expected to be able to do any work for a year or more. Payments generally start with the sixth full month of disability.

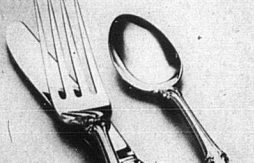
