Auxiliary and a member of the Twentieth Century Club of Millersburg. At the time of her death she was president of the Dr. Plimmer Products Co., Inc., Millersburg. Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Karl K. Lusk, Paris; a son, A.W. Plimmer, West Point, Va.; two brothers, Chester Strober, Ashland; and Gene Strober, Seal Beach, Calif.; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Funeral services were conducted at 12 p.m. Friday, April 15 at the Lusk Funeral Home by the Rev. Cliff Pike and the Rev. Julian Simpson. Burial was in the Millersburg Cemetery.

Wilson Palmer criticizes opponent's tax proposal

However, the amount of revenue which can be gained this way is relatively small. A reduction in revenue because of a cut has to be matched by some other tax or by doing away with some other program or services. I believe a State Legislator should be responsible, not making unreasonable promises, even though they have some sentimental appeal. State Government has to run on a sound financial basis. This has been my philosophy both as a citizen and as a legislator and my commitment to continue this way.

REV. HARRY W. ALEXANDER
Rev. Harry Watson Alexander, 74, retired Presbyterian minister, 123 Johnson Blvd., Lexington, died unexpectedly Sunday evening, April 17, 1977, following an apparent heart attack during a church service. Rev. Alexander was minister of the Central Presbyterian Church from 1934-1946. He was the former chaplain at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Lexington and a former minister at Troy Presbyterian Church. A member of Centre College's Praying Coloredists in 1927, he played on the team that beat the University of Kentucky 7-0. Upon graduation from Centre, he attended the Louisville Presbyterian Seminary, graduating in 1934. A member of the 106 Infantry Division during World War II, he was captured in the Battle of the Bulge and finally liberated at the end of the war. He was assigned to the VA Hospital in 1946 and retired in 1968. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth DeWitt Alexander, and a son, Harry W. Alexander, Atlanta, Ga. Services were conducted at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 19, at the W.H. Milward Mortuary-Broadway, Lexington, by Rev. Thomas M. Johnson, Rev. Eric Mount, Rev. Charles Hanna and Rev. David Bush. Burial in Lexington Cemetery. Casketbearers were members of the Troy Scottish Team. Officers of the Troy Presbyterian Church served as honorary bearers.
