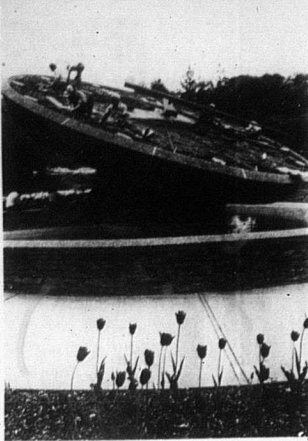

But those two were very successful as the Bluejackets downed a pair of rivals from neighboring Bourbon County: MMI and Bourbon County. The two victories evened the Jacket's season mark to 6 and 6.

It was a good day on the offensive side of things when Bourbon County came to town last week as Nicholas County had three players to pound homers in a 10-1 slugfest. The Jackets fell behind, 4-3, early but soon a three run homer by Bobby Tischer in the fourth inning pulled them to within striking distance. Then Mark Mattix stepped to the plate and powdered one with the bases loaded for a grand slam home run. Tony Hiltche also placed one over the fence for an added Jacket score. Tim Moreland showed some promise in the pitching department during that game as he threw 4 innings in relief and let up only 1 run to a hot handed Bourbon County club.

Greg Letcher and Tom Moreland combined efforts on the mound later in the week to put on a no hitter in an 11-1 five inning affair with MMI.

Trackers to compete Saturday at Morehead

Nicholas County track teams, both boys and girls, will visit Morehead State University April 30 for the University Breckridge Invitational Track Meet.

The day-long competition begins at 10 a.m. at Jayne Stadium.

Donald Iversen, boys athletic director at UMS, is the meet coordinator.

Other schools participating include Bath County, East Carter, Mason County, Louisa, Rowland, Prestonsburg, Menden County, Rowan County, West Carter, Lewis County and University Breckridge.

Sixteen events are scheduled for boys' teams and 12 events are slated for girls. The meet is free and open to the public.

The girls track team picked up a big win last week in a dual meet with Paris by the score of 68-8. Judy Doyle had a good day in the field events during that meet. She won the high jump and then took first in the long jump competition with a leap of 1'11 1/2".

The girls also captured first place in a three way meet with Pendleton and Fleming Counties by picking up 85 points while Fleming had 48 and Pendleton could manage only six.

The boys team picked up a fourth place finish in the Newport Holiday on Saturday. Gary White was the only Bluejacket to pick up a gold medal as he won the pole vault for Nicholas County. White also ran second in the high hurdles.

The boys, in other action last week, demoralized Pendleton and Fleming Counties while they dropped a contest with Paris.

This week, Coach Ben Pumphrey's team has a meet with Bath County at Owingville.

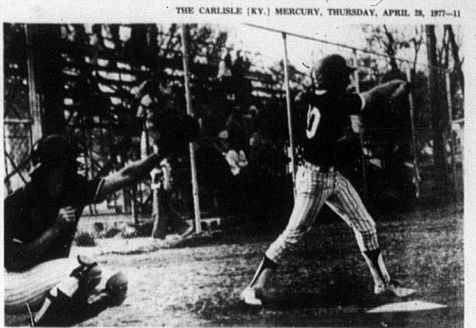

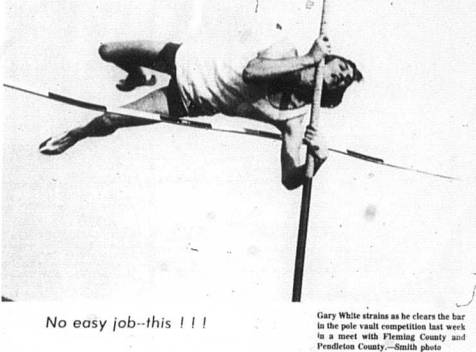
