## Rural secondary roads in Nicholas to get \$206,046 during 1977-78

State Transportation Secretary Calvin G. Grayson of Frankfort has announced that Nicholas county will receive \$206,046 to support its 1977-78 program for rural secondary roads.

Similar allocations to other counties are also being announced locally.

According to Grayson, the Nicholas county program for the fiscal year which began July 1, will provide for maintenance along some 48 miles of local roads.

Specific improvement projects also included in that program are: blacktop resurfacing for 1.4 miles of KY 145, Galloway Hill Road, 3.5 miles of KY 928,

Cane Run Road, 2.1 miles of Headquarters-Millersburg Road, two miles along of Locust Grove Road, and 1.6 miles of Burris Pike.

The rural secondary program was established under a 1968 law to help maintain and improve the farm-to-market and other essential rural roads.

It is financed under a formula which provides that two cents of the tax collected on each gallon of motor fuel sold in Kentucky be set aside for allocation to support rural secondary road programs.

The allocations are announced once annually, on a fiscal-year basis.

## Sen. Ford names Breeze to head Lexington office

Senator Wendell Ford has named Robert Breeze to head his Lexington district office.

Ford said that Breeze will assume his new duties on Aug. 8 as Ford's Lexington District representative. Breeze will be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the district office, as well as liaison responsibilities with the 50 counties which the office will serve.

Breeze, a 35-year-old resident of Frankfort, has been a member of the Kentucky State Police for the past 11 years. He presently holds the rank of lieutenant and is in area supervisor for general investigations at the State Police Post 12 in Frankfort.

During Ford's term as Governor from 1973-74, Breeze was assigned to the Governor's office.

"Bob traveled with me extensively as Governor and is very familiar with Central, Northern and Eastern Kentucky," Ford said. "He will be able to effectively represent me and help us to establish closer working relationships with those counties served by the Lexington office."

A native of Covington, Breeze is a graduate of Holmes High School and is presently working toward a degree in

## Another form of pollution

are certain limited steps people can take right now to help protect themselves from noise pollution.

They can wear earplugs whenever they are involved in particularly noisy jobs, such as mowing the lawn.

They can complain—either in person or to the authorities—about loud disturbances. Many communities now have regulations regarding noise and can cite an offender as a public nuisance.

Other do's and don'ts include:

- Take a noise break when involved in a noisy activity.
- Don't go fringing a noisy job to noisy recreation, such as riding a motorcycle or attending a rock concert.
- Shop for appliances that are quiet.
- First, your own environment will be quieter, and second, if enough people refuse to buy noisy appliances, manufacturers will eventually get the message and stop making them.

—Report noisy conditions in your working environment which may be affecting your nerves.

—Visit an audiologist or otologist who can determine whether you have suffered any hearing loss. He can also give you tips on repairing any lost hearing (if possible) and avoiding future damage.

People who take these steps will be acting in their own self-interest. But, as Lutz and Silverman point out, their entire environment will benefit.
