Ashland Oil donates \$10,000 to Kentucky Conservancy

last Wednesday to receive the \$10,000 Ashland Oil, Inc. contributed to the purchase of 220 acres of the Pilot Knob region to preserve it as a historic shrine and to protect the unique geological and botanical sites found in this region of the Commonwealth. According to the Conservancy, Daniel Boone climbed the knob in 1780 on his first visit to the Red River area and saw the level country of what is now central Kentucky. Designated "The Spencer-Morton Preserve," the area will remain undeveloped so others may enjoy the Boone area.

Scientific Pilot Knob stands 1,466 feet above sea level and 720 feet above the Outer Bluegrass, as the surrounding physiographic area is known. The knob is particularly prominent among other neighboring conical hills or outcrops, 200-million-year-old erosional remnants of younger formations, which dot the region. Wildflowers not usually found here flourish in the unique soil and rock combination, and over 100 species of birds have been observed. The preserve is being used for research and environmental education by Eastern Kentucky University.

The private, non-profit Nature Conservancy with a national membership of 40,000, is devoted to preserving ecological diversity by protecting natural areas. In the 20-year history of the Conservancy has saved more than 2.1 million acres of environmentally significant natural land in 47 states, comprising over 1,800 projects.

Assisting with the campaign are volunteers in the National Council of State Garden Clubs, the world's largest gardening organization with 400,000 members; the Garden Club of Kentucky, a state federation within National Council, is actively involved with the Pilot Knob fund-raising drive.

Bruce Poundstone, chairman of the Kentucky Chapter of the Nature Conservancy, said the organization already has received \$10,000 for the project, and hopes Ashland Oil's contribution will encourage others who can provide the remaining \$10,000 needed to purchase the property.

Ashland provided the contribution through its education and community support program, which offers assistance to a variety of worthy organizations.

The Nature Conservancy's Kentucky Chapter is also seeking \$20,000 in funds to purchase the Boone County Cliffs Nature Preserve, a 46-acre area featuring rock outcroppings 700,000 years old and 300 species of wildflowers.

are under surveillance where about 50 percent damage has occurred to the crop. He warns farmers that the damage period will extend longer than the four to six weeks of an individual beetle life cycle. The eggs were laid at intervals and are now hatching at different times during the summer months. Many farmers feel there was no need to spray because of the short life cycle.

In the ECU experiments, the chemical Sevin was sprayed over a portion of a 1,000-acre test plot at Meadowbrook Farm, owned by the University. Dierley and the result was a 100 percent kill of the Japanese beetle in the fields sprayed with Sevin and there was no return of the beetle to those areas since the spray two weeks ago.
