KU and solar builder cooperate in recording data on energy savings

Kentucky Utilities Company is cooperating with a solar home builder in the collection of data on energy savings resulting from the use of a solar collection system with an electrical backup system.

The solar heated homes built by Solar Group, Incorporated, will contain special metering equipment as part of KU's energy utilization research program.

Construction of the homes was financed locally with no subsidies of any type by government grants. KU said the joint effort was an excellent example of private enterprise working together to find a better way of providing for the community's needs.

The special meters will assist in determining economic feasibility, the effects of solar energy on total energy use, when it occurs, and the amount of energy that will be required as the standby source. The company said the information will be extremely important in planning for future generation load, and if solar becomes widespread, a fair and equitable rate system must also be developed.

Both houses will use solar space heating and water heating. Heat will also be stored in bins of rock for

distribution during periods of cloudy weather and at night. An electricity operated heat pump, including resistance elements, will provide warmth during periods of cold and cloudy weather. In the summer, the heat pump will reverse its cycle to provide cooling.

county and BGI before a final decision is made. The motion to exempt the document was passed 4-1 with Alex Crawford voting against it.

The city has been granted \$23,474 in Revenue Sharing for 1978.

Clarence Moss was hired as a Policeman at a salary of \$400 per month on the same six-month trial basis.

A check in the amount of \$624.90 from EPA was received for reimbursement on the BGI Facilities Study Plan. A contract between the City and LAN Railroad had been received. This contract covers the installation and maintenance of a storm sewer pipe line under L&N tracks at Valuation Station at Dewey Avenue in Carlele. The contract is on a year-to-year basis.

A letter from Jaeger & Associates of Somerset, Ky. was read proposing to do the work for the City on the surveying of Henryville.

The meeting was adjourned until next Monday at 7:30 p.m.

10-18, limits 2 and 19; Wilson's spige, Oct. 8-Dec. 2 and Dec. 10-18, limits 8 and 16, and a special "bonus" blue-winged teal season for Sept. 3 through Sept. 11 with limits of 4 and 4.

Shooting hours for doves will be from 11 o'clock noon until one-half hour before sunset; for woodcock snipe, from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset, and for teal from sunrise until sunset, all prevailing times.

Season dates and limits for other migratory birds, including waterfowl, will be announced in late August, Mitchell said.
