Smoke detector can save lives

Before 1977 ends, more than 7,000 Americans will lose their lives in residential fires—most of them perishing while asleep at night. Another 200,000 Americans will be painfully injured and hospitalized by household fires.

Blazing inferno or smoke-filled death chamber, there's one sure way to get out safely. "Many of the deaths and injuries from fires in the home can be prevented by installing an early warning fire detector system that most families can afford," says Florence J. Parker, Extension home management specialist in the UK College of Agriculture.

A smoke detector costs only \$50 to \$60, and is easy to install. There are about 130 companies making smoke detectors. Some models have been shown in price from \$40 to \$25, says Parker.

Library lease cancelled before columnist's column published

FRANKFORT—It became increasingly clear last week that the controversial leasing arrangement for construction of a new state library building is doomed to cancellation.

The latest development is that the B.T.J. Inc. private building contractor, said through one of its members last week that the concern was having trouble finding financing for the proposed building to be leased to the state at \$200,000 per year.
