Loose-leaf educational program recommended

An educational program involving some 40 million pounds of loose-leaf tobacco was recommended for the current marketing year by tobacco leaders from the tobacco producing states meeting in Louisville recently. The program will be offered to growers in each tobacco-producing county in the eight-state area according to preliminary plans, with each crop-grower packaging half his loose-leaf in compressed bales and the other half in burlap sheets. A 15-member oversight committee was formed at the meeting to develop and implement this year's loose-leaf project. The committee includes one Farm Bureau representative and one land-grant college representative from each of the eight states, plus three additional Farm Bureau leaders, one from Tennessee and two from Kentucky.

loose-leaf marketing have enthusiastically endorsed the new packaging, and said Kentucky growers would probably be happy with either package, he said. He said a resolution to the meeting from the Burley Farmers Advisory Council agreed that plans be immediately finalized for a loose-leaf program this year. The council, representing some 30 county farm Bureau leaders, agreed to submit a minimum of six per cent of the quota be brought under the new program.

Grain storage loan program available

The latest crop estimate on corn for Kentucky is that corn production for 1977 will be slightly less than it was in 1976. Soybean production in 1977 is expected to be up considerably from 1976 with a 27 percent increase in acreage planted and a favorable growing season this year. The grain storage situation in Kentucky is expected to be very tight when the fall harvest begins on corn and soybeans. Farmers are encouraged to take advantage of the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program at their local county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office to increase their own farm storage. This will enable farmers to store a substantial portion of their crops on the farm for a more orderly movement of grain to market and may enable them to obtain a better price for their grain. The farm storage facility loan program has been expanded to assist farmers in this effort. Farmers can borrow up to \$50,000 with a 15 percent down payment at 7 percent interest. The current loan rates for 1977 crop corn have been announced for Kentucky. They range from \$1.80 to \$1.95 per bushel for corn and \$1.80 to \$1.95 per bushel for all other counties in Kentucky. Any farmer interested in making application for a commodity loan or a farm storage facility loan should contact the ASCS office.

Archeological dig uncovers bedrock

FRANKFORT—Bedrock was struck at Fort in a three-week archeological dig sponsored by the Kentucky Historical Society. The layer of bedrock, which is located in the maze area of the fort—located where powder and other explosives were stored—is believed to indicate the structure of natural materials, according to Nancy Penney, activities director for the Kentucky Justice Historical Society (KJHS). "We began to emphasize the structure of the site to keep the students' interest going," she said. "We weren't finding many artifacts—which is perfectly natural in a site such as this," Penney explained that the wall area of the magazine does not continue as a "dig," she added. "Almost 75 per cent of the students' concepts of archeology dealt with artifacts," Penney said. "When we began to emphasize structure, they became excited over uncovering rocks."

The archeological dig, part of a project to be conducted over a two-year period took place July 5-26. Students 16-19 years of age from throughout the Commonwealth participated. Some were KJHS members. Nancy Hughes, curator of the Kentucky Military History Museum in Frankfort, served as a consultant on military archeology. Penney said that "his expertise was invaluable to the students in their work."

"Next year, we will be doing test pits between the magazine and the water barrel area," she said. "Here, we hope to find more artifacts, since this is where the men inside the fort would have slept."

Penney said the KJHS will be digging at the open end of the fort to see what type of original gate was used. "We're doing this as a favor to the city officials because they have been so cooperative. The city is interested in establishing a part of the Fort Boone area (Fort Hill)."

According to Penney, the floor level and the south wall of the fort remains to be uncovered. The KJHS has made up of thousands of students from schools throughout the state. As members of the society, they seek and create projects to broaden their knowledge of Kentucky history. Each year at their annual convention, awards are given for excellence in individual and group projects such as genealogy, historic research and oral history.
