## School Board meets Saturday

The Nicholas County Board of Education held their regular meeting Saturday with the following in attendance: Superintendent Donald Elder, Mrs. Faye Johnson, treasurer; Billy Hopkins, attorney; and Board members: Billy Hunter, chairman; Chester Matlock, William Chandler, Herbert Dyer and Ray Wagner attended. The meeting opened with silent prayer.

Minutes passed are: "To correct the minutes of the November meeting to show Motion 778 concluded: 'permanent to follow by Kentucky Registry of Election Finance.'"

"To accept the treasurer's report which is as follows: Title 1: Balance \$10,000; Expenditures \$81,84; Balance \$1,138.96. Regular Fund: Balance Nov. \$10,315.89; Expenditures \$21,375.74; Expenditures \$108,318.32; Actual balance \$84,672.21 Dec. 1, 1977.

"To open bus bids accepted \$1,660 as is on Bus No. 14-Woods, \$360 for bus No. 22—Lynn.

"To add Chester Brete and Erwin Atkinson to substitute bus drivers' list.

"To add Wanda King and Dottie Hillcock to substitute cooks' list.

"To change food/drink admissions: increase to \$1.50 per person. Advance tickets sale and age 12 and under 75 cents; pre-ordered age 75 and over 1.00.

"To purchase \$961.27 supplies for Biology, Chemistry and Physiology Dept.

"To transfer \$500 to Title 8B Homebound Program for remainder of current year.

"Voted to recess from 8:15 until 9:30 p.m. Rescinded at 9:18 p.m. Mr. Wagner, Mr. Hopkins, and Mr. Hobbins were absent.

Read letter from Attorney General's office concerning unexcused absence of students over 15. Superintendent Elder asked the board to consider limiting number of days of unexcused absence before such absence would result in student's failure. The Board will reconsider this matter in January 1978 meeting.

Board went into closed session at 10:25 p.m. by mutual consent. When they returned they employed Fatsy Hamm as Tractor Aide in Migrant Program.

During the course of the meeting it was announced that Ky. Workmen's Compensation does cover board members while performing official duties. Also sent a vote for three ABE members.

Meeting was adjourned at 11 p.m.

## VA hospitals are silver savers

Kentucky's two Veterans Administration hospitals have salvaged 3,354 Troy ounces of silver from a variety of items during the past 12 months. Selling at \$16.65 a troy ounce, the VA was able to add \$55,633.19 to their supply funds from the sale.

Nationwide, the VA's 172 hospitals reclaimed 387,897 troy ounces of silver.

A review of the above markets showed an average decline of \$2.42 per hundred weight. The Cynthiana market continues to lead the area markets with an average price at the close of sales Thursday of \$123.79.

later. We will try once more to explain to many taxpayers who believe that the new hospital needing money is the reason for the increased property assessments in the county. This is completely untrue. The increased assessments are the direct result of the State Revenue Department insisting that Nicholas County property is not assessed as high as it should be — "100% of Fair Market Value."

The blame for property assessment increases should be placed where it belongs — with the state. The hospital couldn't cause property values to be increased if it wanted to do so. The hospital will need the same amount of money regardless of the total property assessments or the tax rate required to obtain that amount. You can be sure that the Hospital Board will not want to collect any more money than it has to do, because it realizes that taxes are very unpopular.

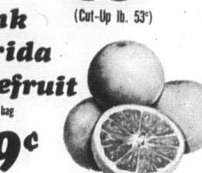
