All persons are welcome to attend regardless of race, color or creed.

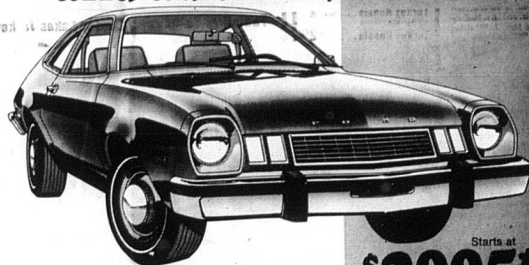


Williams scores

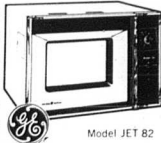

### Rehabilitation Bureau serves 33 locally this year

FRANKFORT — In Nicholas County, the Kentucky Bureau of Rehabilitation Services served 33 people and rehabilitated 13 during fiscal year 1977, according to figures released by the state bureau.

Kentucky remains in the top rank among all states in helping the handicapped reach their full potential as wage-earners according to U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) statistics. "A total of 1,001 handicapped Kentuckians were rehabilitated during fiscal year 1977," said Marshall Swain, head of Kentucky's Bureau of Rehabilitation Services.

Top priority is given to serving those individuals who have serious physical or mental limitations of function in terms of their ability to be employed. Slightly more than 30 per cent of the 37,477 individuals served were severely handicapped, according to Mr. Swain.
