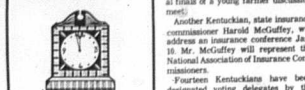


Kentucky to be well represented at American Farm Bureau convention

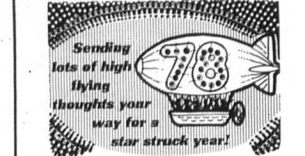
