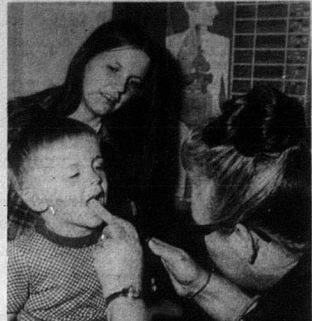

The commissioner added that Gov. Carroll would be relaying his thoughts at the Governor's Travel Conference, 4 p.m., Tuesday, Feb. 8 at the Drawbridge Motor Inn in Covington.

Are you tired of opening your mail only to find more "junk" mail? You can do something about it. School routers, mail order files, membership lists of various organizations, phone books and many others are sources of names and addresses used to create mailing lists. These lists are utilized by companies to send catalogs, product samples, sweepstakes tickets, magazine subscriptions, pornographic literature, and fund-raising requests to you. This material which is termed third class mail by the U.S. Post Office is direct mail advertising.

Post Office has a list of consumer names who do not want to receive this kind of third class literature. Every company mailing this material to a farm that will add your name to mailing lists. Remember, when receiving offers and advertising through the mail, check all the facts before signing a form or spending your money.
