Should porno crackdown extend to sex ed films?

The widely publicized conviction of Hustler magazine publisher Larry Flynt in Ohio recently on state charges of pandering obscenity in organized crime is but the latest example of the growing furor against pornography in this country.

Even many liberals and civil libertarians, who once could be safely counted on to defend the peddling of pornography on "freedom of speech" grounds, are now having second thoughts.

In a recent Washington Post article dealing with the growing exploitation of children in the production of pornographic materials, for instance, New York lawyer Charles Kemler, who
