In other business the board: Extended the terms of all the present members of the Board of Directors of Johnson-Mathers Home, Inc. (henceforth to be known as Johnson-Mathers Health Care, Inc.) through the fourth

Monday of the following January. The Board of Directors of Johnson-Mathers Health Care, Inc. had amended its by-laws so as to change its annual meeting to the fourth Monday in January.

—Authorized the Nicholas County Clerk to buy drapes for her office at a price of \$473.90 from Daugherty Paint and Supply Co. in Paris.
—Set the maximum compensation (fee plus salary, if any) at \$17,376.64 for the year 1977 as authorized by KRS 64.527 for the following officials: county judge, county attorney, county clerk, circuit clerk, sheriff, jailer, justices of the peace, county commissioner and coroner.

Commonwealth's use of revenue sharing funds

FRANKFORT—Gov. Julian Carrill has announced the release of the Commonwealth's Actual Use Report for general revenue sharing funds spent during the period July 1 to Dec. 31, 1976. Total revenue sharing expenditures amounted to \$12,664,951, of which \$12,397 was spent on operating programs and \$12,622,554 was spent on capital construction projects. The operating expenditures were made from a revolving trust fund established for orphan land reclamation. The funds spent on construction projects were primarily in the areas of education, economic development, corrections, and health services.
The \$12,622,554 in capital construction expenditures represent only a portion of the general revenue sharing funds available to capital construction projects during the 1976-77 fiscal year. Due to the varying planning and construction stages for the projects concerned, only actual expenditures for the period July 1 to Dec. 31, 1976, were reported for construction projects rather than total estimates. The remaining general revenue sharing funds appropriated for such projects should be spent as they approach completion.
In accordance with the federal law which requires that the Actual Use Report be published in a newspaper of general circulation, the report was published in the Feb. 18 edition of the Courier-Journal.

months of age and given in three doses eight weeks apart with the fourth dose being given 12 months later. Booster doses should be given shortly before entering school. Tetanus and Diphtheria (TD) are given in one dose at age 12, then repeated every 10 years. Measles, Mumps, and Rubella are given at 15 months of age.
The next Immunization Clinic at the Nicholas County Health Center will be held on March 1, 2, and 3 from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Parents should check their child's immunization record to be sure he is protected from these preventable diseases.
