Nicholas loses to Elliott 74-55

The fortunes of Nicholas County's basketball team took another downward turn last week in the Lewis County Invitational Tournament as the Bluejackets were outplayed, 74-55, by Elliott County. With the loss the Jackets' record slipped to 2-8.

Nicholas County coach, Bill Anderson, credited Elliott County's ability to break the Bluejackets' press as being the big difference in the game. "The press is our game, and it didn't phase them," commented the Jacket beltedman. "They were able to break the press without slowing down."

It was Elliott County's size that intimidated the Jackets in the first period of play. The Lions worked inside over a cleared Nicholas County front line and broke out 13-4 early in the game. A couple of baskets by Joe Ruddle, pulled the Jackets within striking distance, but Elliott County came back with three straight baskets before the end of the period to go out 16-10.

Elliott County broke out in the second quarter with six straight points and took a 23-10 lead over the Jackets. At that point Steve Cartinger began a scoring spree in his finest performance in the year and pulled the Bluejackets back at 26-15. But that comeback was

cut short as Elliott County began working patiently and taking it inside on the Jackets, bouncing out in front 46-24 at the half.

The only bright spot in the game for Nicholas County occurred at the beginning of the second half when the Bluejackets broke out of the locker room with a spirit that outscored Elliott County 10-3 and pulled back to within nine points. But again, the spear soon splintered and Elliott County commanded the rest of the game.

Property to be reported is: REAL ESTATE: Residential, farms and commercial.

TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY: Automobiles, mobile homes, boats, commercial equipment and inventory, etc.

INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY: Stocks, bonds, accounts receivable, notes, and mortgages.

It is the responsibility of each taxpayer to report their property to the Property Valuation Administrator's Office located on the 2nd floor of the Nicholas County Courthouse. In addition as to what you have, we also need to know what you think the FAIR CASH VALUE is.

Reporting Period is JANUARY 1, 1977 thru MARCH 1, 1977.

Homestead Exemption Information:

1. For those already under this exemption, your amount of exemption will be applied automatically, not to exceed the new limit of \$3900.
2. The only time you need to reapply is when you change residence.
3. For those that turn 65 years of age during 1977, you must fill out an application in the P.V.A. office between January 1, 1977 and March 1, 1977.
4. The primary requirements for eligibility are:
 - 1) You must be 65 years of age or older during the year for which the application is made.
 - 2) You must own, maintain and reside on the property for which the exemption is sought.
