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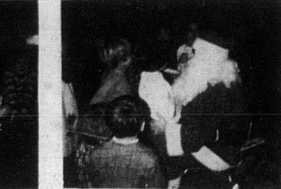

Are You Cheering?

There are a great many things that you can do (almost all of them low-cost) to winterize your home; things as simple as being sure the damper is closed when you're not using your fireplace. These money-savers are just as important to your home as anti-freeze is to your car. If your home is airtight, you save money. If it's not airtight, you are burning up money.

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USDA reports increase in crop disease application

Applications for disaster payments in 1976 rose by 48 percent, the U.S. Department (USDA) reported recently. Figures compiled through December show 386,144 farmers applied for payments in 1976 compared with 260,621 applications in 1975. The 1975 figure was the lowest since the program began in 1973.

Under the current legislation, farmers may be eligible for payment if they are prevented from planting wheat, feed grains or cotton or if yields for these crops are greatly reduced due to bad weather or other insurance, although farmers are not required to pay premiums to be eligible for payment.

According to officials, extremely dry weather over much of the U.S. during 1976 was the cause of much of the increase in applications. Most of the applications were for reduced yields, particularly for wheat and corn.

Despite bad weather and the resulting increase in disaster applications, record crops for both corn and wheat were produced in 1976.

The following data table gives figures on the disaster program for the first three years of the program. All figures are as of Dec. 31.

Year, 1974; application filed, 451,831; payments made (millions), \$209.2; year, 1975; application filed, 350,621; payments made, 139.9; year, 1976; application filed 386,144; payments made 259.0.

This disaster payment program is administered by USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). For information on the program check with the local ASCS office on Main Street, Carlisle, Ky.
