Council approves zoning ordinances

Veach Berry, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, recommended two ordinances to City Council Monday night. The ordinances were approved by the Commission at a public hearing held on June 22. Both were approved by City Council 4-0.

The first ordinance permits home occupations. The other ordinance clears the way for funeral homes to be placed in the city with the approval of the Board of Adjustment on each individual request. A public hearing is necessary before this conditional use can be approved, it was stated.

Council went into closed session to discuss police working hours and employee salary increases.

After returning to open session, Council announced the new schedule of working hours for the police force. It also raised employees salaries.

Employees making over \$500 will receive a 4% increase; those making under \$500 will get a 7% increase. This includes part-time employees. Doug Willis was promoted to assistant foreman under Gayle Vanlandingham. Sam Fluch was promoted to sergeant on the police force. The increases are retroactive to July 1. Council did not raise the firemen's salaries. It will meet with the firemen on this matter on July 18.

Mayor Bill Power announced that the city and county are seeking someone to serve on the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Committee of the Bioregion Area Development District. Miss Pat Allison has resigned because other duties which conflicted with the job. This is the only committee at the present time, on which Nicholas county is not represented at BICAD. Anyone interested is asked to contact the Mayor or Judge Mildred Clark.

A bid on repairing the roof at the City Building was tabled until the adjourned Council meeting scheduled on July 25 at 7 p.m. The adjourned meeting will be held to open the bids to install a bigger gas line to the nursing home and factory area. The city and county have agreed to pay part of the expenses of the line. Bill Grandfather has been requested to pay a portion of the cost also.

'77 acreage reports due

Nicholas county farmers are reminded that they need to report 1977 acreages of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, and barley to the county ASCS office by Sept. 1, according to Eugene Letcher, County ASCS Committee chairman.

1978 farm program legislation now under consideration in Congress provided that if a set-aside is necessary next year, the amount of set-aside may be based on a percentage of the acreage planned for harvest in 1977.

Fall seeded crop acreage, wheat and barley, must be reported prior to harvesting if possible. Farmers who have already begun or completed harvest should contact the ASCS office immediately. Crop acreages and the crop use must be reported on a field-by-field basis.
