Since top of the stove cooking seems to plague the kitchen and home cooler I thought a few good recipes for top of the stove cooking would come in handy these hot days. Some are one dish meals, and with the addition of a salad and/or dessert, will satisfy most any appetite.

SKILLET BEEF STEW WITH DUMPLINGS

1 tablespoon flour
2 tablespoons oil
1 leek, salt
1 leek, salt

1/2 cup water
2 potatoes, peeled and cut into cubes
3 large carrots, peeled and sliced
1 large onion, peeled and chopped
1/2 cup cider
2 cups water
1/2 beef bouillon cube
1 pinch of marjoram

1/2 cup bacon mix, your own or commercial
1/2 cup milk

Combine flour, salt and pepper; sprinkle over meat cubes. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large skillet or heavy kettle on medium heat, add meat and onion. Remove meat and set aside.

Add remaining oil to kettle and add vegetables and brown lightly. Return meat to kettle along with cider, water, bouillon cube, and seasonings. Cover and cook 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until meat is tender. Mix together bouillon mix and milk and drop by spoonfuls onto boiling stew. Mix uncovered for 10 minutes, then cover and cook 10 minutes longer. Before adding the biscuits be sure the liquid is level with the meat and vegetables. Should you need to add more liquid, do so before you add the biscuits and bring to a boil again, then add biscuits.
