## Commemoration program Aug. 13-14 at Blue Lick Battlefield State Park

The annual commemoration of the "Last Battle of the Revolutionary War" will be held this year at Blue Lick Battlefield State Park Aug. 13-14.

The two-day celebration, being planned by the 10-county Blue Licks Commemorative Commission, will be highlighted by arts and crafts, canoe races, the laying of flowers at the mass grave of those who died in the battle, and music of all kinds. Food will be sold

by civic organizations from the area throughout the celebration. Arts and crafts people are particularly being sought to participate. Any local craftsmen who might be interested, are asked to contact Joseph H. Conley.

If there is enough interest, a flea market will be located in the area where the "Simon Kenton" outdoor drama was presented in 1974 and 1976. The other activities are being planned

in the areas where they were located last year. The "Last Battle of the Revolutionary War" was fought Aug. 19, 1782. The State of Kentucky held its Bicentennial Celebration last year at Blue Lick Aug. 19-22. This year's celebration will be similar to last year's, but on a smaller scale.

## OVER 100 Property owners file appeals

Over 100 property owners have filed appeals on their new property assessments, and the Nicholas County board of assessment appeals is being kept busy all this week hearing them. A board member, Harold Mitchell, and Monday that the board probably won't be able to hear all of the appeals this week and will schedule the remainder next week. He said they are attempting to hear 15 cases per day. No final decisions are being made as yet, but Mr. Mitchell thinks that most assessments appealed will be lowered, judging by the eight cases the board heard Monday morning. Three Department of Revenue employees canvassed the compact residential areas of Carlisle, adjacent to Horse Lick, and Lake Carroll recently coming up with a total increased valuation in these areas of \$5,000,000. Other board members are John Cleaver Sr., chairman, and Orla Caswell. When the local decisions are made by the board, the state can still appeal further.
