### Not enough tobacco to raise in Nicholas county?

"It looks like many Nicholas County Tobacco Producers will not have much tobacco to raise for 1977 unless they do some leasing" stated Anna L. Conner, director of the Nicholas County ASCS office. Recent reports indicate that approximately 275 Nicholas county farmers stored carryover tobacco during the 1976 tobacco market. The total number of pounds of processed carryover for the county was 53,062 compared to 46,778 pounds stored in the 1975 crop year.

Each producer's pounds of carryover tobacco will be deducted from his marketing card prior to being issued from the ASCS office. Producers wishing to check the number of pounds of tobacco they have stored should contact the ASCS office.



### City opens gas bids

Sealed bids to install a new gas line to the Nursing Home and Blue Grass Industries were opened Monday night at the adjourned meeting of City Council. Ron Absher, surveyor of Jasper & Associates, Emmert-Emmert, opened and read the bids. Mr. Absher took George Brewer's place as gas advisor to the city.

The bidders will be notified within 10 days as to which will be accepted. A called meeting of Council is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 1, at 7:30 p.m., to decide the matter.

The bids are as follows:

Labor only: W.C. Abone Co., Inc. of Winchester, Ky., \$94,42.90; Power Line Const. Co. of Stanton, Ky., \$77,714.92; P & C Const. Co. of London, Ky., \$54,732.40.

Material only: Consolidated Pipe & Supply Co., Louisville, Ky., \$11,420.20; W.C. Abone Co., Inc. of Winchester, \$17,461.90.

Salaries of the Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chief were raised to \$50 annually retroactive to July 1. Firemen's salaries were raised from \$12.50 per meeting to \$13.50 per meeting with fire calls remaining at \$1 per call.

Council decided unanimously that all gas contracts not signed will not be honored after July 31, 1977. Nicholas County Schools are the only large gas customer who has not signed its contract to date.

Election of Board Directors, Farm Home Advisory Committee members, as well as operations reports, will highlight the annual membership meeting for Southern States Carlisle Cooperative on Aug. 2 at Nicholas County High School. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m.

Herbert C. Duncan of Carlisle will serve as chairman of the local meeting.

William F. Fine of Lexington, a member of Southern States Cooperative's regional staff, will report on the over-all Southern States operations. His report will also discuss the cooperative corporation's role in the free enterprise system. In a cooperative individual proprietors join together to form a corporation whose sole objective is to provide goods and services that are different in that the independent businessmen, the farmers who own and control the organization are its primary users. Another difference is that the main objective of the organization is to serve the needs of the owners and not to accumulate profits.

Local operations and services rendered to agriculture in the community will be discussed by manager Michael S. Martin.

The theme of the meeting will be "Cooperatives—Free Enterprise with A Difference".

There will be special recognition for local board and regional Farm Home Advisory Committee members who retire this year.
