They were taken to Bourbon County Hospital, then transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington.

Mrs. Duncan sustained a cracked pelvic bone, broken collar bone and ribs, ruptured diaphragm, and other internal injuries. She underwent surgery, and was placed in the Intensive Care Unit, where she remains a patient. Her condition is listed as critical.

Miss Owens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Owens, Carlisle, and Miss Kimes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Kimes of R. T. Ewing, sustained severe facial cuts. Plastic surgery was required over one eye for Miss Owens, with possible further surgery for both girls. Miss Kimes was cut around the mouth. They were released from the hospital Monday, June 13.

Nicholas county to lose regional library to Flemingsburg Aug. 1

The Buffalo Trace Regional Library, located in the basement of the Nicholas County Library building, will be moved to Flemingsburg, effective Aug. 1, after serving area libraries for almost 16

years, according to a letter received by Mrs. Merilyn Sams and Mrs. Lucille Neel last week.

The regional library was originally located in Carlisle because county residents passed a 6 1/2 cent library tax

in 1961 with a promise from then state librarian, Mrs. Margaret Willis, that the regional library would be placed here, if the high tax was passed. Nicholas county was the first county in the area to pass a tax for a library. Most other counties have since voted in only two or three cents for libraries.

How to cope with energy problem and state legislature highlight summer KPA convention June 16-18

Discussions on how to cope with the energy problem and the state legislature will highlight the annual summer convention of the Kentucky Power Association at Lake Barkley, June 16-18.

A panel of experts representing the coal, gas, oil and electric industries will all assembled editors and publishers what to look for in the energy field during the remainder of the 20th century and beyond.

Parson Harrison, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Energy, will head the panel. Other participants will be Tom Shirley, vice president of the electric Power Research Institute; Robert T. McCowan, senior vice president, Ashland Oil, Inc.; and John Gregory, vice president, sales, Texas Gas Transmission Corp.

Carroll Knicely, chairman of the power group's legislative committee, will chair the program dealing with legislation expected to be considered by the General Assembly next year.

This will include efforts to close certain public records in the name of privacy and bills that would eliminate or drastically change existing requirements that public officials keep the public informed of what government is doing through public notice or "legal" advertising.

To find out how well newspaper people are coping today, volunteers from the Kentucky Heart Association will be on hand to offer free blood pressure checks to those attending the convention.
