Arizona man injured here

Ronald Akre, Phoenix, Ariz. was admitted to the Nicholas County Hospital last Thursday morning for treatment of injuries he received in a tractor-trailer accident.

Nicholas County Sheriff Russ Smoot reported Akre was traveling toward Mayville on Route 68 near Forest Retreat Farm when he lost control of the vehicle, struck a culvert, crossed to the other side of the highway and hit a telephone pole. The pole broke on impact, Smoot said.

According to the accident report, the 1977 model tractor-trailer, which is the property of Midwestern Distributing Company of Ft. Scott, Kan. was carrying a load of paper to Mayville. Both the tractor and trailer were damaged considerably in the mishap. Sheriff Smoot stated.

Born in Morefield, the son of the late James and Marilla Vice Denton, he was a member of the Victory Christian Church, Lexington, Lodge No. 1 F. and A. M. and the Lexington Consistory Valley of Lexington.

Beef referendum deadline June 17

The Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office is now registering beef producers up until June 17, to vote on the beef research and information order. Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum.

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 60 beef producers, from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produce beef during the calendar 1978 are eligible to register. This includes fenced operations as well as dairymen. Each actor is eligible to register. The Nicholas fenced operation registration is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she is producing independently of the family operation.
