Part of the fun of summer is eating meals out of doors in the fresh air with family and friends. It is an especially good way to spend the 4th of July. And much safer than getting out on any highway.

Portable appliances, handy in the kitchen, can move outside and do double duty. Foods cook automatically, after you have prepared everything and stay warm too. One of the most versatile appliances is the electric skillet. It can be used as a frying pan, steamer or small oven.

If you have an electric outlet on your porch or deck so much the better. If not, do take extra precautions when using extension cords.

The main-line, using the electric skillet will even make a CHERY CHEESE PIE, however do make the pie the day before whether you use your oven or electric skillet. To make the day easy, make the salad, and prepare and cook the meat the day before.

Keg refrigerated until time to cook.

MEAT LOAF SKILLET MEAL
3 slices day-old bread
1/2 cup very hot skim milk
1/4 pounds lean ground beef
1 teaspoon seasoned salt
dash of tobacco
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 small onion, grated
1/2 teaspoon parsley flakes
1 egg, beaten
salted oil
1/2 cup chicken broth or 1 chicken bouillon cube dissolved in 1 cup hot water
Carrots, peeled and cut to half 6 medium sections, sliced in chunks
12 fresh mushrooms
1 tablespoon instant minced onion
Make meat loaf; soak bread in hot

milk; set aside. Combine meat, seasoned salt, tobacco, Worcestershire sauce, onion and parsley flakes in a bowl. Combine egg and bread-milk mixture. Add to meat and toss to mix. Push into sliced loaf pan. Chill overnight. To cook, heat 2 tablespoons oil in electric skillet set at 320 degrees to 340 degrees; add mushrooms and onion lightly; set aside. Unsoak meat loaf into skillet; add more oil if needed, and slowly brown on top and bottom sides. Add chicken broth; cover. Turn temperature to simmer and cook 20 minutes. Add carrots and simmer 20 minutes, then add mushrooms. Sprinkle with instant minced onion. Sprinkle just until mutton is crisp brown. Arrange mushrooms over all and cook until heated through. If necessary add more chicken broth.

That is a treat in itself. Now for a fast salad recipe.

FRUITED APRICOT MOLD
1 (3-ounce) pkg. orange flavored gelatin
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
dash of salt
1/2 cup water
1 (12-ounce) can apricot nectar (1 1/2 cups)
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 can mandarin oranges, drained
1/2 cup pineapple chunks, drained, save liquid
1 cup seedless grapes
1 (3-ounce) pkg. cream cheese
1 1/2-ounce can, cranberry orange gelatin, unflavored gelatin and salt
Heat water and apricot nectar. Stir in 6 medium sections, sliced in chunks
12 fresh mushrooms
1 tablespoon instant minced onion
