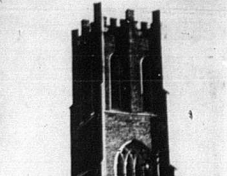




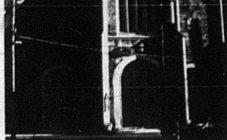
Mahven Hill, the Moore-Redd-Frazier House, located on the Georgetown Pike just outside Lexington, is a one-story Federal brick structure. The original section was built about 1790 by the Rev. James Moore, the first president of Transylvania University and the first Rector of Christ Church Episcopal.



Christ Church Episcopal, the first Episcopal church west of the Alleghenies, stands southeast of Market and Church Streets, Lexington. It is an early Gothic structure built in 1848 by John M. Murtry.

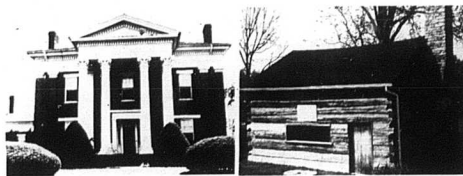


Chilton, located off Highway 227 between Georgetown and Stamping Ground, is an example of the transition between the Greek and Federal styles of architecture. It was built around 1843 by Leonard Johnson, the nephew of Richard M. Johnson, Vice President under Van Buren. Slave quarters stand behind the house.



Behind the Captain James Wright house stands his pioneer log cabin built around 1780. Both the house and cabin are located southeast of Panola on the Lexington Pike. The brick portion of the Greek Revival structure was built in 1791 by Wright, a Revolutionary War soldier and early settler of Bourbon County. The frame addition was added in 1825 to his son, James Wright II. The modern portico which connects the two additions was added later by Judge and Mrs. W. B. THE 1870'S LIVE ON IN BLUEGLASS ARCHITECTURE—Five structures of Federal and Greek architecture in the Bluegrass region have recently been added to the National Register of Historic Places, announced Mrs. Eldred W. Melton, state historic preservation officer. Mrs. Melton is also the executive director of the Kentucky Heritage Commission, the state agency concerned with the identification, preservation and protection of historic properties.



Fairfax Greenacre, home of two Kentucky Derby winners, Isenby Grand in 1911 and Shut Out in 1942, is located six miles northeast of Lexington on the Park Pike. The Greek Revival country house was built in the 1850's by Thomas Hughes. In 1926, the house was purchased by Payne Whitney, son of the renowned horse breeder, W.C. Whitney.
