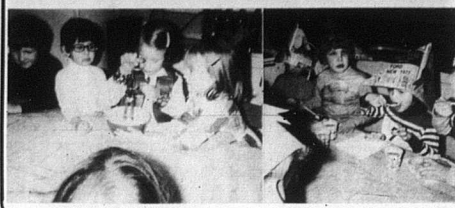

Summer youth corp job applications due April 15

FRANKFORT—Application forms for summer jobs with the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) are being

sent to high school principals and local Manpower Services offices, says J.E. DeBoer, commissioner of the Bureau for Manpower Services in the Department for Human Resources. Completed forms must be returned by April 15. To be eligible for the jobs, youths must be at least 15 but not over 18 years old, be interested in and able to do outdoor work, have a Social Security number, work permit and their parents' consent to participate in the program. The YCC is a federally-supported work-study program. More than 300 jobs will be available this summer, in both federal projects and local projects funded from a state grant. Positions will be filled by a random draw of eligible applicants. The Bureau for Manpower Services is recruiting young people, both men and women, for all YCC jobs in Kentucky.

Deadline for UK summer classes registration is April 1

Kentucky students planning to register for classes this summer at the University of Kentucky are reminded that Friday, April 1, is the deadline for applying for admission or readmission for any summer session.

Dr. Elbert W. Ockerman, dean of admissions and the registrar at the University, said that this deadline reserves space in UK's advising offices.

Monday, May 16, is registration for UK's four-week summer session which is scheduled, June 15-Aug. 11 on the Lexington campus. Registration is

Wednesday, June 13.

Ockerman said that June 1 is the deadline for all Kentucky students to apply for admission to the fall term and be assigned a Summer Advising Conference date. Non-resident students must apply before April 1.

The 1977 fall semester at UK begins Monday, Aug. 29, with classification, registration and drop-add. Wednesday, Aug. 31, is the first day of classes.

Students who apply for admission to the University are required to take the American College Test (ACT). Students may contact their high school counselor for testing dates and additional information.
