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124 sign up for blood drawing; volunteers still short of need

"It is urgent that people living in Nicholas, Bath, Robertson and Bourbon counties who are depending on the Nicholas County Blood Donors Group to supply their needs, make an appointment to give blood Monday," according to Rev. H. Dallas Sugg, chairman. As of press time Tuesday 124 people had signed up.

The Central Kentucky Blood Center will bring its staff and equipment to the First Baptist Church on Monday, March 21, between the hours of 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.

The Blood Center and the Nicholas County Ministerial Association are asking any healthy person between the ages of 18 to 66 to contact Rev. H. Dallas

Sugg at 289-5293 or 289-5658 or Rev. Herman Kamlage at 289-5052 and make an appointment to donate.

There are seven people in Nicholas county who are calling other Nicholas counties and asking them to make an appointment. It is very urgent that appointments be made and kept. If you have a question about whether you can donate or not, contact one of the co-chairmen, and they will be able to give you some information.

"The remaining amount of blood for this year is 214 units. If we can get 190 units of blood this time, March 21, then we can be fairly well assured that in two more drawings we will be able to get the remaining amount," Rev. Sugg

said. If these 214 units are obtained before Oct. 31, it will be the first time that Nicholas county as a whole will be self-sufficient.

Blood, along with other natural resources, is at a critical low at this time. Many would-be blood donors have not been able to get to the Center in Lexington to donate and the mobile blood donor unit from the Center has not been able to get to previously established sites. Many industries were closed because of the gas shortage and this has forced the Center to draw from its reserves. So far, no surgeries have had to be cancelled, but without a continued effort to reach willing blood donors, surgeries planned in the near future may have to be postponed.

Dudley named to Governor's commission

FRANKFORT—Gov. Julian Carrill has announced the appointment of some 200 Kentuckians to serve as advisers on the Governor's Economic Development Commission. Andy Dudley, president of the First National Bank is the local commissioner named by Gov. Carrill.

The commission, chaired by Louisville businessman John Y. Brown Jr., studies ways to improve the state's economic development with specific emphasis on providing more jobs for Kentuckians. The advisers, leading citizens from throughout the Commonwealth, are grouped into five task forces, on industrial development, agriculture, energy, finance and tourism/travel.

The total number of candidates for election in this year's county election is 36. The filing deadline for the May 24 Primary Election is still two weeks away.

There are 10 county positions to be filled. The following people have filed for candidates for election in the past week:

He also was honored by the Jaycees with the Distinguished Service Award.

He is an active member of the Nicholas County Christian Church, where he is serving as Sunday School Superintendent. Carter is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau, Daughters Lodge No. 65, co-chairman of Heart Fund in the business district, and director of the Salvation Army House.

A group of businessmen were included in the session during which Nicholas County President James E. Carter will be a featured speaker.

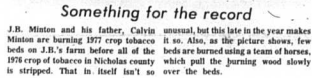
