Use appliances wisely!

Electric appliances have contributed greatly to the improved life-style of most Americans. But with rising energy costs, you should be careful to use those appliances to their greatest efficiency. For instance, be sure there's no leak through the seals of your refrigerator and freezer doors. Insert a piece of paper between the seal and the unit's door frame. Then pull the paper. If the paper slides out easily, the seal probably needs to be changed.

When using the surface units of your electric range, use flat bottom pans with straight sides, and use the unit that best fits the pan.

About 20% of the heat is lost every time the oven door is opened. So open your oven door only as often as you must.

When using a dishwasher, remember that the cost is the same for a few dishes as it is for a full load. So load your dishwasher fully, and properly; and use adequate detergent so that rewashing is not needed.
