Brothers meet for first time in 36 years

[Editor's note: Mrs. Bobby Hatten called us about this article which appeared in the "M. Sterling" column on March 18. Because of the Nicholas county connection, we decided that some of our readers might remember the family. Therefore, we are printing the article in its entirety. We appreciate Mrs. Hatten bringing it to our attention.]

For 36 years Frank Vice has been separated from two of his brothers and for 36 years he had wondered what they were doing. They were living in Kentucky, he thought. Earlier this year, he and his wife Mary, who live on the Grassy Lick Pike with their seven children and his brother Avery, decided it was time to quit wondering. They started searching through records and making phone calls. By 9 p.m. on March 3 they had located both brothers, Jimmy Fletcher of LaGrange and Larry Adair of Harrison county.

On Sunday, March 6, the family was reunited at the Vice's home and the two "lost" brothers were caught up on three and one-half decades of family history they had missed. Frank Vice remembers very well the difficulties of 1941 that caused the family separation. They lived in Nicholas county then and Vice was 15 years old when his father, Lora Vice, died, leaving his widow to care for 11 children. With little in the way of welfare assistance and no work to do for women, the Nicholas county authorities removed the three youngest children and placed them in a children's home in Louisville. Larry was four years old, while Jimmy was only one year old. Both boys were placed in families while a sister who grew up in the children's home, eventually returned to her family. She now lives in Indianapolis.

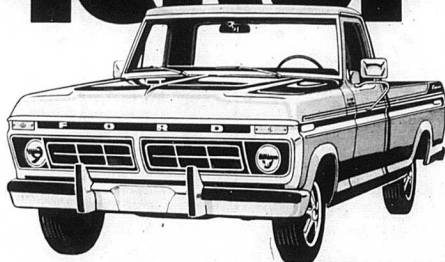
