Garden project underway here

Human Resources Secretary Peter Corn has announced the approval of an \$87,700 contract with the Kentucky Association of Community Action Agencies to provide seeds, plants, fertilizer and tools for low-income elderly citizens of Kentucky.

The Nicholas County Fiscal Court has provided one-half acre of land at the County Farm to be used for this project locally, Maxine Todler, Nicholas County Outreach Worker, said the plot is scheduled to be plowed this week. The garden will be financed with money from the area Community Action Agency.

The community garden project, which supplied 3,261 people in 30 counties, including Nicholas, last spring, will attempt to double its service production by expanding to statewide coverage.
Corn said the program was designed to facilitate the distribution of fresh vegetables to needy senior citizens as well as provide an opportunity for their participation in production.
