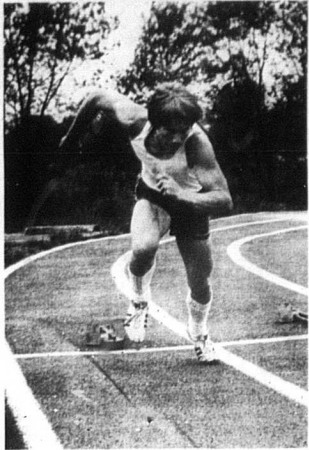


# Boys win track meet in field of 1 Saturday



The Nicholas County boys track team captured first place in the University Breckridge Invitational track meet held Saturday at Morehead in non-participation against ten other schools. The competition went right down to the wire and Nicholas County clinched it by beating out East Carter in the Mile Relay with a time of 9:45. Gary White captured a first place in the 120 yard high hurdles with a personal best time of 1:4.5, while Jim Smith pulled in number one honors in the discus with a throw of 129'9". Mike Berry ran his best 400 of the season by turning in a time of 50.4, and Anthony Williams achieved his best 200 with a 27.1 second performance. The girls team bettered some misfortune and were only able to score five points in the meet.

Class A schools entered include Nicholas County, Boone County, Elliott County, Fairview, Fleming County, Ashland-Holy Family, Lewis County, Hancock, Rowan County, Hazel Green, Menley County, Pikeville, West Carter, Paintsville, Elk-horn City, Louisa, Mullins, Maguffin County, John's Creek, Prestonsburg, and University Breckridge. MSU Track Coach Buck Dawson is the meet director.

### Education Commissioner visits Lexington

FRANKFORT—The newly-appointed U.S. Commissioner of Education, Dr. Ernest L. Boyer, urged school administrators to maintain close communications with teachers and children in the classrooms during a visit to Kentucky in late April. On his first visit to Lexington, D.C. since his appointment on April 1, Dr. Boyer took time to tour a Lexington elementary school and chat with students there. "I am here to spend time in the school and be with children," Dr. Boyer told reporters at a press conference during his tour of Breckridge. "I want to stay in close touch with school people and the classrooms." During his two-day stay in Kentucky, Dr. Boyer emphasized his belief in local control of schools. "I recognize the importance of having schools remain close to the parents, close to the children," he said. An head of the U.S. Office of Education (USOE), Dr. Boyer feels that federal money should be used to enhance local programs. "I believe in control at the local level, coordination at the state level, and enforcement at the federal level," Dr. Boyer said during a luncheon speech at the Southeastern Conference for School Finance Equalization. ### Degrees to be awarded at UK Sunday

A prominent industrial and community leader, a well-known medical educator and a nationally recognized American historian will be awarded honorary degrees by the University of Kentucky in May 8 commencement. The UK Board of Trustees has approved a recommendation that Earl D. Wallace, long active in Lexington business affairs and historic restoration projects, be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Science, and that Dr. Holman Hamilton, a retired UK professor of history, be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters. Wallace is UK graduate; Pelligrino is a former chairman of the UK Department of Medicine, and Hamilton received his Ph.D. degree from UK and served on the UK faculty for 21 years. Wallace, a native of Knox county, is being honored for his industrial and financial leadership, and his contributions to the civic, cultural and educational growth of the Lexington community and the Commonwealth. While at UK, Dr. Pelligrino served as chairman of the University Senate. He was dean of the School of Medicine at the State University of New York, Stony Brook, from 1964 to 1972, and currently is chairman of the board of directors of the Yale-New-Haven Medical Center. Holman Hamilton is a native of Ft. Wayne, Ind., where he later was an editorial writer with the Ft. Wayne Journal for 10 years. He joined the UK faculty in 1954 and was a Guggenheim Fellow in 1946, a recipient of the UK Alumni Association Research Award in 1965, the Hallam Book Award in 1966,

### UK Great Teacher Award in 1968 and again in 1972. He was voted Distinguished Professor in the UK College of Arts and Sciences in 1971 by his colleagues. Dr. Hamilton has written six books and numerous articles in a variety of journals. He has been active in local and national historical association, and has recently been elected vice president of the Southern Historical Association.
