**A Tribute to Dorsey Watkins**

Dorsey Watkins served unselfishly as a director of the Nicholas County Water District since its beginning 12 years ago.

A native of Nicholas County he was the son of the late John and Stella Johnson Watkins and a member of the East Union Christian Church. He was a landowner, a member of the Kentucky Wildlife Federation, the Kentucky Historical Society, charter member and past president of the Nicholas County Fish and Game Club. He was President of the Year in the Eighth Wildlife District in 1962, former member of the Carlisle Rotary Club, a Kentucky Colonel, and was a member of the committee instrumental in the development of Lake Carnico and was director of the Lake Development Association, having supervised construction of the road system and the progressing development of the lake area.

Mr. Watkins died on Friday, April 8, 1977 at his home on the Lower Jackstown Road. He was 72 years old, married to Grace Gause Watkins, and the father of a daughter and two sons, Mrs. Lynn R. Ebert, Dorsey Lynn Watkins and Gerald Watkins.
