An architect and a mechanical engineer who are among the nation's foremost authorities on solar energy will be featured speakers at a University of Kentucky seminar at Shakerlytown Conference Center, Pleasant Hill, May 10.
"Focusing on Energy—Solar Seminar Number Three," will explore passive solar systems, active solar systems, solar economics and utility rate structure.
The speakers will be Richard L. Crowther and Donald Fry, both of Denver. Crowther, an architect, is president of Crowther Solar Group, Denver. He has designed more than 75 buildings that utilize solar energy.
Fry, a mechanical engineer, is an authority on the economics of constructing solar energy buildings.
The seminar, which lasts from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., is sponsored by the UK College of Engineering Office of Continuing Education and the UK Institute for Mining and Minerals Research. Cutworms and yellow striped army worms invading tobacco beds

Cutworms and yellow striped army worms are beginning to pose problems in tobacco beds over Kentucky, according to reports from growers.
"The yellow striped army worms usually effect only a small section of the tobacco bed," the entomologist said, "so only the infested portion may need to be treated."
He recommended a rate of application of 10 pounds of Dylax 9% bait per bed, or one-half pound in one pound of Dylax 9% bait per bed.
In experimental tobacco beds at the University of Kentucky, it has been found that a mixture of Orthene tobacco insect spray used in flea beetle control has also controlled the cutworms and yellow striped army worms, he noted. The recommended application is two tablespoons of 75W per three gallons of water per bed.
Schubert warned the tobacco growers, however, not to use Dylax insecticide spray at the present stage of tobacco plant growth because of the danger in causing plant injury. He said only the Dylax bait preparations should be applied.
