Administrative Regulations Review Committee of the Legislative Research Commission, an amendment to Kentucky's constitution, was passed by voters in November 1975. It reformed the court system which had existed in the state since 1891. Under the article, all courts including police courts, justice or magistrate courts, and quarterly or county courts in Kentucky were incorporated into the state court system.  
In order to prevent counties and cities from losing revenue due to implementation of the article, the Special Session of the General Assembly provided that the base court revenue of local courts be returned to localities. The General Assembly also directed the Department for Finance and Administration to draw up regulations governing the return of this revenue to counties and cities.

Under the regulations, the finance department will notify city and county judges of the necessity of determining the base court revenue. Base court revenue is determined by averaging court revenues for the three fiscal years ended June 30, 1975 and 1976. (Net court revenue means the gross revenue collected by the local government from fees, fines and forfeitures assessed by a local court minus the operating cost of that court. These funds don't include parking fines unless collected by an action taken in a local court.)

The regulations require each unit of local government to respond with a determination of the base court revenue by July 15. They responded in one of three ways: That they didn't have 30 local court as of June 30, 1976; that they are including a statement of their base court revenue; or that their court system was operating at a deficit and no reimbursement is available. The finance department will mail letters to cities and counties for the localities to fill out, regarding this information, and return.

The finance department will review each base court revenue determination through an audit process, and will notify cities and counties of the result of the review.  
Under the law passed by the General Assembly, localities must provide "reasonably adequate" space to operate in. In addition, any income that counties or cities derive from new or existing sources as a result of the implementation of the Judicial Article would be subtracted from base court revenue.

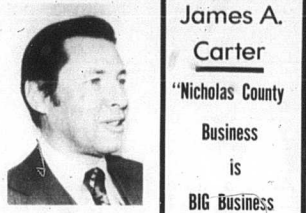
In determining net court revenue, the regulations noted, any item of expense or revenue should be included in the computation "if the item will be assumed by the state in connection with the operation of the court after Jan. 1, 1977" when the state will assume full responsibility for the new court system.  
The first quarterly payment to counties and cities who will be reimbursed by the state, will be made on or about Jan. 31, 1978.
