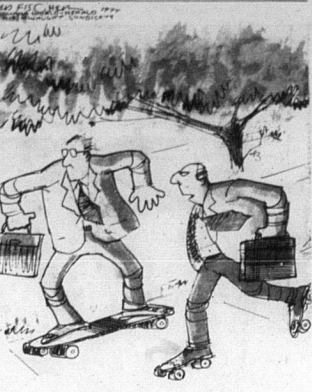
Three Town opened last Thursday, May 13, with 156 members and Miss Alma Haddock, well known to Carlisle and Nicholas county teenagers as his director.
